We had hoped for a parade through the town to mark the anniversary, but the virus had other ideas.

They kept the Group going online while others stopped; they went back to the hall and the woods as soon as they could; they spend huge amounts of time training and planning. When Storm Arwen devasted so much woodland, and our beloved Scout Wood lost so many trees, we had people there clearing the trees to make it serviceable. It feels wrong to single out individuals (and once I started it would be hard to stop) but I can't fail to mention Andy Beaumont. He's been an invaluable source of advice and support to me in my time as Chair and I'm not sure I could have done it without him.

Monday Beavers

It's been another fantastic year for Monday beavers. It's hard to believe that it has only been a year since we have been able to properly resume face to face scouting. To kick off our return back to scouting we had a Beavers activity day at scout wood where the beavers got to do some soft archery, low tight rope, blind rope trail, rope swing and finished with a camp fire and songs. During the summer term we had lots of fun lighting fires, backwoods cooking – where we made chocolate bananas, smores and cinnamon bread twists, and den building for our outdoor challenge badge. We also worked on our navigator badge learning how to read maps, use a compass, and discuss what we need to take on a hike, before using the skills on a very hot sunny hike. We also did our safety and health and fitness badge activity badge. We finished our summer term with a very fun pirate night – where the beavers went on a treasure hunt to find the pirate treasure and marshmallows, and build a catapult before ending with some pirate songs.

After the summer we had a packed programme. We were back up to scout wood with some archery, then campfire and marshmallows. We had a visit to the Oxton Bird Garden learning about all the amazing animals they have, followed by two weeks of the health and fitness badge and we did 3 weeks of first aid, all before the October holidays. After the October holidays, back in the hall, we had a visit from the Tweed Valley Mountain rescue team – the Monday beavers got to try on all the gear, use some of the equiptment, race down the hall with a stretcher and have a play in the landrover – we only turned on the sirens once. We have had a very sticky chocolately Halloween party where the beavers had a go at making chocolate apples. We finished off the international activity badge, the beavers had been learning how to say hello in 17 different languages, we tried fruit from around the world and found out about scouting in 4 different countries. We rounded off the term with the space badge, a skills night, some Christmas crafts and a movie night.

During the winter term we doing lots of activity badges – we did animal friend where we had a lots of furry, feathery and scaly visitors, money skills, global issues and camp craft badge where we were looking at camp blankets, put up tents, cooking on camp stoves, fire lighting and campfire songs. As we finish off this term and year we look forward to our first beaver camp in 3 years. It will be a very fun weekend at Hawkhirst with lots of fun activities.

Explorer Scout Report

We currently we have thirty-two Explorers in the unit, making us one of the largest Explorer units in Southeast Scotland. Sixteen of our young people are going through the Young Leader program and assisting the younger sections within the group. Our membership ranges from 14 years to 17.5 years old, of which there are eighteen males and fourteen females. Our members are drawn from across Lauderdale, Melrose, Earlston, St Boswells, and Kelso.

Autumn 2021 began with an influx of new Explorers from across the Borders. With the light nights we had several weeks of hikes up Blackhill, Earlston, and the Eildon's, before retreating to Scout Wood as the nights drew in. Our fire lighting, and axe and knife skills were honed, and we had an evening of learning to prep and cook pheasant over open fires. The latter half of the season was predominantly indoors where we covered international issues, dilemmas, and had Explorer led evenings on topics such as Plastic Pollution, and Climate change.

Our Winter 2022 term has been largely hall bound with meetings covering International Women's Rights, back to basics pioneering skills, knot work, a Chinese cooking night and various discussions on managing dilemmas. Since the beginning of the Russian invasion of Ukraine our young people have had a keen interest in understanding why the conflict has come about, and how to help the Ukrainian people. We had an excellent and very informative Q&A evening with a member of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, who had been evacuated from Ukraine at short notice. The unit are now organising various fundraising efforts to raise money to help Ukrainian's get to safety in Europe. Currently sixty-five pounds have been raised from a bake sale at Earlston High School.

Our Summer 2022 term faces disruption from the onset of study leave and school exams, with a significant proportion of Explorers declining to attend Explorer meetings until the exams end in early June. We have about nine Explorers who are taking part in the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award scheme, and they are preparing for their hikes and excursions. Eleven Explorers have already earned the Bronze Award, and one has her Silver Award.

We're now back at Scout Wood where we have been clearing up the storm damage from the winter and practising our fire lighting and knife and axe skills. We hope to round out the season with more hikes and plan a summer hike and light camp.
